The Dean's Message



Greetings!

I bet we all have a favorite organ practicing story. Mine happened in France twenty five years ago. I was on tour in Normandy with the choir of Magdalen College, Oxford, where I was Organ Scholar. The tour was being cut short because the funeral of a generous benefactor to the college had been set sooner than expected. The music chosen for the funeral included Fauré's Requiem.

I had played Fauré's Requiem once before (on a strange organ in Birmingham, England that had one manual with mechanical action and the other with electric) and I said I could have it ready for the funeral if I had a chance to practice it while we were in France. A British organist living in Caen arranged for me to spend a couple of hours practicing at the church of St. Etienne at 12.00 noon on the last day of the tour, while the rest of the choir went to view the Bayeux tapestry.

St Etienne in Caen is famous for its 1885 Cavaillé-Coll organ, still in its original condition. I had never played or even heard a Cavaillé-Coll organ, so I was excited to visit. I allowed plenty of time to get to the church and followed my instructions closely. I remember walking up a spiral staircase and out onto the roof of the church to get to the west end balcony (tribune) where the organ is located. Walking through the organ itself to get to the console, I enjoyed looking at the framed blueprints on the walls. Situating myself at the console, I found everything I was expecting: Montres, Bourdons, Trompettes, Hautbois, Voix-humaine and lots of Flûtes. I opened my score of the Fauré and remember having my hands poised above the keys ready to play when I heard an organ chord. I was confused at first, looking around for what could possibly be making the organ play itself, until I remembered that in French churches there are often two organs, the large Orgue de tribune and the small Orgue de choeur. Here was my problem: another organist in the church. I walked back out through the organ, onto the roof, down the spiral staircase, and along the length of the church to where the other organist was seated at the console of the Orgue de choeur.

I studied French for ten years in school and could read and write it well enough, but had *Continued on page 2*

never had an actual conversation in French. This turned out to be my chance! After asking "Parlez-vous anglais?" and being told "non" I stumbled through a conversation explaining why I was there, and how I had been told that I could practice the organ. It turned out that 12:00 noon on that day was the time always used by this other organist to practice, and the British organist should certainly have known that. She had some pretty colorful things to say but, once she had got them out of the way, she told me I could come back at 2:00 p.m. and practice. I returned at 2 and spent a wonderful couple of hours with Messrs. Fauré and Cavaillé-Coll.

I've enjoyed other trips to France, even sitting in the tribune at Notre Dame cathedral watching Olivier Latry play for Sunday morning mass, but that was the only time I've played a Cavaillé-Coll or had a conversation in French!

Keep practicing and let me know your favorite story when we meet at an A.G.O. event. The Pipes Spectacular is coming up, and Music at the Monastery. I hope you can come!



Dedicated in 1898, the church is in the shape of a Jerusalem Cross in neo-Byzantine architectural style. The church and extensive contemplative gardens include full-size replicas of shrines from the Holy Land (the Franciscans have ministered there for 800 years), plus catacombs and a Lourdes Grotto. The monastery also has two hermitages for personal retreats. The Monastery's Lively-Fulcher pipe organ was built in 1998 and contains forty ranks of pipes over three manuals and pedal.

Together with the Franciscan Monastery, the DC AGO is proud to support a series of community outreach musical events titled, "Music @ the Monastery". These events are free of charge and take place on the second Sunday of each month at 4pm, followed by a reception. All are welcome!
